## The Early Years Foundation Stage



- While at Hillside we provide the children with a wealth of experiences to enrich their lives.
- Compulsory full time education begins the term after a child's fifth birthday. The period from birth to the end of the reception year is the Early Years Foundation Stage. It is distinct and important in it's own right and in the preparation of children for later schooling. The Early Learning Goals set out what is the expected attainment by most children by the end of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

## The Early Years Foundation Stage



- Early Years' education is important for all children. An educational programme appropriate to their age and stage of development is essential.
- In this environment children will be safe and secure to play, have fun, explore, experiment, develop confidence, curiosity and to learn. They should be involved in activities, which have a clear purpose and rationale, not necessarily an end product.



## The Early Years Foundation Stage



The curriculum is made up of 7 different areas; 3 prime and 4 specific as detailed below.

#### Prime

- Personal , Social and Emotional Development
- Communication and Language
- Physical Development

### Specific

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

#### Personal, Social and Emotional

This area of learning is about emotional well being, knowing who you are and where you fit in and feeling good about yourself. It is also about making relationships, building self-confidence and managing feelings and behaviour.



### Communication and Language

This area of learning includes listening and attention, understanding what has been said and speaking confidently in many situations.



#### Physical Development

This area of learning is about improving skills of co-ordination, control, manipulation and movement. Physical development helps children to gain confidence in what they can do and enables them to feel the benefits of being healthy, active and looking after themselves.

#### <u>Literacy</u>

This area of learning includes being read a wide range of books, Reading simple texts, letter sounds and writing for a variety of purposes.



### Mathematical Development

This area of learning is about developing mathematical understanding through stories, songs, games and imaginative play. This will include counting, sorting, matching, patterns and working with numbers, shape, space and measures so that children enjoy using and experimenting with numbers. Children's mathematical development arises out of daily experiences in a rich and interesting environment.

### Understanding of the World

In this area of learning children develop the knowledge, skills and understanding that help them to make sense of the world. This forms the foundation for later work in science, design and technology, history, geography and information and communication technology.



#### Expressive Arts and Design

This area of learning is about developing the child's imagination and the ability to express ideas and feelings. It includes art, music, dance, role-play and imaginative play. Children's creativity develops best within a rich learning environment supported by sensitive and responsive adults.

This curriculum is planned around four main themes:

## The Importance of Play!

- Play is both indoors and outdoors, it is a key way in which young children learn with enjoyment and challenge.
- Play needs effective adult support to extend and support children's learning.
- Play needs a stimulating, challenging and secure environment.
- Play needs a wide range of resources that are safe and clean and suited to the needs of the children.
- Play gives children opportunities for many practical activities which are interesting, enjoyable and based on first hand experiences.
- Play gives children time to practise, and build up ideas, concepts and skills.
- Play allows children to take risks and make mistakes.
- Play allows children to think creatively and imaginatively.
- Play gives children time to relive anxious experiences or talk about fears in a secure and safe environment.

## Reading in Nursery

- At Hillside, we place great emphasis on encouraging the children to read for pleasure. We do this in a number of ways.
- Author of the Term Each half term we focus on a different author, we read stories from the author and find out some interesting facts about the author.
- Reading Rocket As an incentive to encourage reading we have the reading rocket initiative, we ask children to read 3 times a week to be entered into a prize draw. The draw takes place a the end of each half term.
- Reading for Pleasure When starting nursery each child receives a 'Reading for Pleasure' booklet, this has a list of 25 books that we feel are 'must reads' for Nursery age children. Each week your child will choose to take one of the listed books home, giving them the opportunity to access them all during the year.

## **Assessment**



- Teacher-led activities while your child completes activities set by the teacher they will be assessed against the learning intentions for the specific activity, from this next steps can be planned to develop your child's learning.
- WOW moments you will be given some blank WOW moments during the transition week. We love to hear of new/special moments that your child has done, we ask for you to fill in a WOW moment and send it in so that we can share this with the class and celebrate your child's achievement.
- Half-termly assessments the children will be tested on the key skills in literacy and mathematics.
- End of year reports- this is an overview of your child's time in nursery and will discuss social, emotional and academic achievements.





- 40% per cent of children in Stoke On Trent show a delay in language skills compared to 15% nationally
- Concerns? Under 5's can be self-referred via your Health Visitor.

#### **Early Communication Screening**

- Completed within the first few weeks of the child attending Nursery
- Short and fun 10 question assessment
- Identifies any areas of need that can then be addressed through interventions during your child's time in Nursery.
- Children are re-assessed at the end of the Summer Term

\*\*If your child has a dummy please work on taking this away, this can have a huge impact on their speech development. \*\*



## What it is like in Nursery...

As you will already be aware with having your child at home, no two days are ever the same; however, at school we endeavour to implement a clear structure to the day. Having a timetable allows the children to gain a sense of what is coming next and it helps them to feel secure in their environment. During the transition stages this is extremely important to help your child settle.

Throughout the day the children will work with Miss Hewitt and Mrs Pope, this could be 1:1 or as part of a small group. They will be involved in whole-class carpet time sessions, and they will also have the independence to initiate

their own learning through play.

## **Tuesday Mornings**

- Things are a little different on a Tuesday morning, the children are taught by our two specialist teachers.
- Firstly they will have PE with Dan
   (Children will come to school in their PE Kits on a Tuesday)





After PE the children then go to Music with Mr Hall. They will explore new instruments, enjoy music and movement and have lots of FUN!



## **School Drop Off and Collection**

### Coming to school....

The door is opened at 8.45 am and children can arrive up to 8:50 am. The children will come through the nursery and reception door - this is accessed through the KS1 playground, the left hand door as you look at the building.

### Going home...

Children are collected at 3.15pm from the same door that they were dropped off at.

If someone unknown to the staff is collecting your child please give the school prior warning and make sure the adult collecting has the password you set up. Children MUST be collected by an adult.

## Lunchtime



- We are very lucky to have our own on site catering team, they offer a lot of choice between meals and these are on a 3 week cycle.
- Each day there is a selection of hot or cold food.
- Our lunchtimes are a lovely social time, the children sit down with each other, aswell as Miss Hewitt and Mrs Pope. During this time we learn good eating habits, table manners and we develop our speaking and listening!



## **Hello Little Ted**



- Little Ted is our class bear, he likes to spend a weekend with each child in Nursery.
- He comes to visit Friday Monday. We ask that he is returned on a Monday with his belongings so that we can get him ready for his next adventure.
- When he comes to your house he will have a diary sheet to record what he has been doing over the weekend. You may want to include photos or get your child to draw a picture. We will then share this with the rest of the class upon his return!



## **Forest Schools**



When the children are more settled in the Nursery environment we will begin Forest Schools. Once a week we will take our learning into the woods.

A letter will go out during the first half term to confirm when this will start.

Children will need:

- Waterproof trousers and coat (not an all in one suit)
- Wellies

These are to be kept in school at all times and should be named.

On our Forest School day children will come 'dressed down', children are to wear either black leggings or black jogging bottoms with their school jumper/PE hoody. NO jeans please.

## Exciting events during the year!



- School trips throughout the year we go on different visits linked to our topics. We choose and plan these carefully to make it a memorable and meaningful experience for your child.
- Showcases this is an opportunity for you to come into school and share time with your child, taking part in activities linked to the learning they have been doing in class.
- Celebration Assemblies children are recognised for their work and displaying our school values, each week 2 children receive an award.

## **Common Worries**



- Toileting we ask that all children are toilet trained prior to starting Nursery. If your child is not yet, please try and work on this during the summer.
- Settling/leaving some children may find it upsetting when they are left for the first few days. Please be assured that we do all we can to comfort your child and make them feel safe and secure. When dropping off we ask that you make it as quick as possible as it can make it harder for them. In most cases the tears stop before you are even out of the gates!
- Eating many parents worry that their child will not enjoy the meals at school. As explained there are many different choices and we can support your child with making these choices. If we are concerned about your child's eating habits we will discuss this with you.

## **Induction Process**

- You will receive a transition booklet about your child's new teacher and teaching assistant along with images of the classroom – please share this with your child over the summer.
- Miss Hewitt will contact any previous settings that your child has attended (if your child has used one).

Children will be in school full time.





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- Parents and Carers are the most important first educators in the child's world. They continue to develop this teaching role.
- Partnership with parents has a positive impact on the child's development and learning.

#### Class Dojo

In September, you will be sent login details for Class Dojo. Teachers will post stories several times a week, updating you on your child's topics and learning. You will be able to 'like' and comment on these posts.

#### **Parents Evenings:**

- Parents are invited to parents' evenings during the year. You will be able to discuss your child's progress with members of staff and letters of the dates and times will be sent home.
- ► If, at any time you have any questions or concerns please come in and discuss them with a member of staff or the Headteacher.

#### School App


We have a school app that can be found on your app/ play store. We strongly recommend downloading this, it is updated regularly with examples of the children's learning, notices and special events that have taken place.

- All clothing/ items must be named!
- Book bag (provided by the school)
- Spare uniform clothes in case your child has an accident whilst in school. (Additional jumper not needed)





- Encourage independence dressing and undressing particularly!
- Toileting
- Talk about the transition share the transition documents we have sent home, walk past the school
- Share songs and stories
- Encourage talking
- Losing the dummy
